

We are a presbytery when our lives and resources are linked around common values, in common purpose, toward the fulfillment of our common calling to serve as disciples of Jesus in the world today.




Given all that remains uncertain, what will we do? And for what purpose? In the pages that follow, we describe some of the intentions that will shape our life in the coming year.

We are the Church, Together


In common commitment to the life and witness of the Presbyterian Church (USA), we will:



We made the pivot. The congregations of Carlisle Presbytery are now found both in-person and on-line. For many, it was a big learning curve, to discover how we could use technology to worship, learn, visit, and meet.

Continuing our vital ministries during a pandemic, we're still learning. So we promote and/or offer training that helps us use technology to deepen and widen our lives, in Christ. We clear the way for grants to help with costs of tech tools. And we use electronic communication tools, social media and a website to keep timely information and resources before the presbytery.

Although we sometimes grow weary of Zoom-space, it allows us to break down geographic boundaries and to expand opportunities for engagement in learning, governance, and relationship-building.



With the move into new office spaces, renting two small simple offices in this building, we've significantly reduced our office footprint (and expenses). Still ahead - converting paper files to digital, to further reduce our storage needs.

We're becoming a virtual/digital presbytery that also exists in physical space and real time, connected for the sake of Christ's mission.

Congregations: Thriving in Our Witness



With so many congregations in pastoral transitions and a denomination-wide shortage of interim pastors, how will our congregations prepare to call their next leader? And now that we are more aware of the adaptive challenges we share, what will position our congregations to thrive?

Questions such as these led the Commission on Ministry to initiate a partnership with PneuMatrix, an organization that brings adaptive change leadership skills for congregational transformation. Our partnership links the transition teams of nine congregations with a PneuMatrix consultant and local apprentices to help them make informed decisions about their future, in less time.



Who are we? Why are we here? What is God calling us to do?

To answer questions like these, the teams will use data from a Congregational Assessment Tool (CAT). They will read and discuss Canoeing the Mountains, going deeper in their understanding of what they will need in their next pastoral leader. And they'll use Mission Insite to better understand the needs of their neighbors. The goal is to be ready to elect a Pastor Nominating Committee or describe an alternative future path, after a six-month engagement with this learning and discernment. This initiative is the next step as our presbytery adapts to a changing environment.




We're becoming a learning community - engaging with each other, training leaders as they respond to God's call, and retooling with skills and strategies for vital congregations.

Creating Beloved Community

When asked, "What do you care about, that is worth working toward?" some leaders in our presbytery answered - "Existence...having a Presbyterian presence that matters, in this region...and a distinct Presbyterian identity that offers a life-giving alternative in a world often confused about what it means to be Christian." And then they began talking about their need to learn what sustainability and vitality mean in a changed culture. "We want a spirituality that engages the world rather than retreats from it," they said. "We desire to be disciples of Jesus more than consumers of religion." They spoke of care for people impacted by racial justice and economic disparities. They said they hear the groaning of our planet and want to practice earth care, as individuals and congregations.



The Agile Presbytery:

Enacting Governance to Navigate Change



The colorful stegosaurus stationed outside the building where our offices are located, reminds us that our context matters! As our communities change, we must adapt.

We had already begun to experiment with the dates, times, and formats of presbytery meetings, when the pandemic hit. It hasn't always gone smoothly, but Zoom has allowed us to tend to the essentials of our common life.

Now it's time to go Hybrid. We are eager to meet in person again, and we want to make the widest participation possible. As pandemic conditions allow, we will begin to experiment with meetings that offer both in-person and on-line participation.





We're revising by-laws, standing rules and some policy documents to bring greater flexibility to the work we share, as Presbyterians governed by our theology and polity.

No longer on auto-pilot, we're thinking through what no longer works. And we're trying new ways of fulfilling the functions that serve the needs and empower the mission of our congregations

Dear Partners In Christ's Service,

This statement of mission currently guides The Presbytery of Carlisle:

We exist to support our congregations for faithful service to God in the name of Jesus Christ.

And it used to be enough, for a presbytery to support the congregations within its bounds....when our institutional structures were sound, when the place of our congregations in society was clear, when we knew how to connect our experience of the gospel with the needs of our neighbors.

But not anymore.

Now we are living through a global pandemic at the same time we face on-going racial injustice, political divisiveness, economic inequities, and 'code red' for



our planet. This, along with sweeping cultural changes puts unique pressures on congregations. What is our calling now? How will we carry out our mission under these conditions? Where will God lead us?

To thrive in this time of immense change and uncertainty requires wisdom, courage, resilience and hope. Adapting to a changed world is not easy. Therefore, we must embrace this time of experimentation and learning, so that our congregations may be **empowered** and **transformed** to thrive as 21st century gospel communities.

It is not yet clear, what new patterns for fulfilling our mission will emerge. The form of our witness has already changed in ways we wouldn't have imagined two years ago. And there's no going back. While we can't know what lies ahead, we can open ourselves to the influence of the Spirit of Christ today. And we can link our lives and resources with shared intention, in common purpose.

Margaret Wheatley has written, "The primary way to prepare for the unknown is to attend to the quality of our relationships, to how well we know and trust one another."

When Change Is Out of Control.

To me, this is why the presbytery matters - because the changes we are moving through and the crises of our world are bigger than we can manage alone. We're at our best when we walk together, making visible the love of God that connects us and all of creation. I look forward to continuing our discernment, that from the soul and substance of The Presbytery of Carlisle, God's healing, saving intentions may be known.
