Emily Sutphin's Statement of Faith

I believe in the one Triune God: Creator, Christ, and Holy Spirit.

God the Creator is the Divine Parent of the universe and all living beings. Our Creator's creative work continues daily. Our Creator is infinitely wise, eternal, holy, and perfect beyond comprehension. Our Creator created the universe because it was pleasing to do so. Our Creator modeled humankind in God's image and charged humankind with caring for one another and creation. However, humanity repeatedly rejected their Creator and failed to do God's will. Therefore, our Creator ordained leaders and prophets to encourage people to turn back and remember their God. When humankind rejected these leaders and prophets, our Creator sent God's Son, Christ, to reconcile us to God.

The Spirit unites us with God and one another and sends us forth into the world to serve with acts of love. The Spirit is wherever people are gathered in God's name.
