Dear Friends,

In last year's message, our Interim Executive Presbyter, Cheryl Galan, drew wisdom from a book called *Holy Currencies* by Eric Law. In it he describes a 'Cycle of Blessings' that flow inward and outward, making ministries both missional and sustainable. In short, he speaks to the idea of **God's abundance and provision**. I find myself deeply connecting with that idea as expressed through the words of the prophet Isaiah. Seeds give rise to bread for nourishment. Seeds also give rise to more seeds so the cycle of growth may continue. God provides abundant blessings and the blessings flow in many directions.

This idea also resonates with me through my work as a chaplain. When I served in a community hospital, nurses were asked to name what inspires them in their work. Something a nurse wrote has really stayed with me: the healing flows both ways. At first blush that seems impossible. After all, the nurse is working hard, all hours of the day and night to provide top quality medical care to give the patient's body the tools needed for rest and healing. The healing seems to flow in one direction, from caregiver to patient. Energy exerted, care received.

Yet over time I began to experience the deep truth of the healing and the blessing flowing both ways. Sometimes it was very tangible as when a patient offered to pray for *me*, the chaplain. In other ways, it was very subtle, a shift happening deep within my soul as past hurts and deep wounds began to heal through the sacred work of being present to a person in pain.


And isn't that the way of God? The healing flows both ways, the blessing flows both ways, the receiver becomes the giver and the giver becomes receiver. Seeds are sown, they grow, and give rise to new seeds. Seeds go to the eater AND to the sower. As we engage in Christ's ministry and mission, Spirit empowers and God's abundance is revealed, over and over again.

2024 Budget: Intentions and Purpose



2024 Expense Budget = \$ 488,929 2024 Projected Income = \$ 490,278

Our presbytery budget tells a story. It reflects our common calling, our shared values, and the intentions to which we give our lives and resources, in faithfulness to Christ's call, within and beyond our congregations. As we open ourselves to God's abundance and seek to accomplish God's intentions for us and the world, we see the blessings already flowing throughout our presbytery including:


- Transforming and empowering congregations for engagement with community needs.
- Cultivating space and creating structures to support emerging expressions of the gospel beyond the walls of institutional forms of church.

 Addressing the compelling crises of our day, such as systems of poverty, structures of racism, environmental devastation, and re-building of congregational vitality.

We do not take for granted, the faithful Per Capita, Designated Mission and Shared Mission giving of our Sessions. We know that the resources of congregations are increasingly stretched, so the flow of blessings in this budget include the potential use of \$85,000 in anticipated gains from the presbytery's reserves. The Administration Committee is also taking action to be more intentional about managing investments and tapping other resources for the future.

Vital Congregations: Thriving in Our Witness

What is the purpose of vital congregations? *To go deeper into following Jesus*Christ, so our own lives are changed, our congregations are transformed, and the mission of God spreads through our particular communities and the world.



What would God have us do next?

Many congregations continue to hold this question as the model of one pastor, one congregation no longer seems to serve well in some places. To explore other possibilities, representatives from 15 churches attended a workshop called "Choose Your Next Church Adventure" at the February Presbytery meeting. Some of these congregations are ready to move forward in the search for a pastor. Others are asking more questions about themselves and taking time to better understand the needs of the community they seek to serve.



In March a Communion training was held for Ruling Elders so they may be prepared to preside at the table in the absence of a Minister of Word and Sacrament. This was intended to assist churches without an installed pastor to be able to offer the Sacrament.





The Committee on Preparation for Ministry is gearing up to promote awareness of the formation process to become a Commissioned Ruling Elder, a lay person who is equipped to serve in specific ways. CREs provide much-needed support in word, sacrament, and congregational care and are a viable alternative to the one pastor, one congregation model.

Agile Governance: Nurturing New Life and Growth

What is the purpose of our agile governance?

That we may reflect the goodness, wisdom, beauty and love our Creator intends for us...and for all of Creation!



Moving with God's blessings requires agility! We live in liminal time - between the breaking down of structures we thought were durable, even 'permanent' and the emergence of new forms of religious expression, education, government, business, community, etc.

As Presbyterians, we stand with one foot in the forms of institutional church we know and love...and one foot on the threshold of God's future yet to be revealed. Our polity gives us a framework of governance. With agility, we're better able to adapt to the needs of a changed world. What does agile governance mean for Carlisle Presbytery?

Staffing for A New Normal

Now that the full-time position called Presbytery Leader for Governance and Congregational Leadership (encompassing the role of Stated Clerk AND empowering leadership) has been filled, a search is underway for another full-time position called Presbytery Leader for Vision and Transformation (formerly known as Executive

Presbyter). This new person will guide congregations and individuals in exploring new ways of experiencing and sharing the love, peace, and hope of Christ. In the meantime, Lucy Bowerman is serving as our Bridge Presbytery Leader to assist with Administration, COM, New Worshipping

Communities, and Coordinating Council until the new Co-Leader is called. We are also blessed to have a Director for Communications, Carolyn Simpson, who is able to manage the routine office operations and has graphic design and social media skills we are eager to put to use.

Streamlining office operations: We now occupy a one-room office at 2601 N. Front St., Harrisburg, and store additional things at Faith-Immanuel Church. We continue to dispose of things and have donated office supplies and furnishings to churches, individuals and non-profit organizations who could use them. Several boxes of materials were recently delivered to the Presbyterian Historical Society and we plan to further reduce our storage needs by digitizing our files and records.

Building-in Flexibility:


Gradually, we're revising our by-laws and policy documents and processes to bring greater flexibility to the work we share. And we're not alone! The 225th General Assembly (2022) approved 33 proposed amendments to the *Book of Order*—including a replacement for the entire *Discipline* section, expanded boundary training requirements, and family leave,

antiracism, and harassment policies for all councils (i.e. sessions and Presbytery). Look for more information on these important topics in the months to come.

Cultivating a culture of risk-taking and experimentation: About half of the churches of the presbytery continue to be in pastoral transitions; some can no longer afford a full-time pastor, while others are eliminating or revising positions formerly held by an ordained pastor. With a denomination-wide shortage of pastors and continuing decline in church membership/attendance, we must experiment with different models of leadership. Some Sessions find pastoral leadership across denominations. Some link to share a pastor. Others are served by a Commissioned Ruling Elder. CPM will continue the work of preparing leaders while COM will provide guidance and opportunities for experimentation.

Soul Tending: Our lifeline to God

What is the purpose of our soul-tending? That we may be lifted out of ourselves and be gathered together in God's love.



Spirit-Inspired worship - at Table, font or pulpit, through music and metaphor, in visual imagery and spoken words of prayer – helps us receive the grace that sustains us. This can be accomplished on a Sunday morning with traditional liturgy and hymns but can also happen in other ways ...





Several churches in the Presbytery are extending hospitality by hosting refugee families. On World Refugee Day, Second Carlisle treated their family to a day at Hershey Park.






Lost Creek has a ministry of prayer where the congregation prays for people having a particular name each week...and the community knows it!

Communication: Common Calling. Common Values.
